

Governor Adeleke Launches Imole Business Empowerment Scheme

2000 Youths, Women Gets Start-up Business Grant

sun State Governor, Senator Ademola Adeleke on Thursday launched Imole Business Empowerment Scheme for youths and women of the state.

The Governor at the while launching the initiative at Staff Development Centre, Abeere noted it is targeted at 2,000 women and youths across the 30 Local Governments and the Area Office of Osun State.

He said, "We are gathered here for the presentation of **Business Registration** Certificates, Point-of-Sale Terminals (POS), and Start-Up Grants to 2,000 women and youth beneficiaries of the Imole Business **Empowerment Scheme** 1.0, organized by the Ministry of Cooperatives and Empowerment in partnership with First Bank Plc and Fidelity Bank Plc.

"Each beneficiary will walk away today with: C A C B u s i n e s s Registration Certificate; POS Terminal, and a Start-Up Grant, to immediately begin their j o u r n e y i n t o entrepreneurship and financial independence.

"Beyond the handover of tools and funds, this scheme is built on capacity building and training, so our beneficiaries can grow and expand their businesses sustainably. This initiative is not just about today; it is about building the future of Osun State.

"It is about equipping our people with the skills, opportunities, and support to thrive. By focusing on women and youth, we are investing in the most productive segment of our society."

Governor Adeleke further highlighted advances already

recorded by his administration in all sectors.

"In January 2024, Osun State held its First Cooperative Summit and Awards, the first of its kind in the history of our state. It was at that maiden Summit that I announced a ₦1 Billion Cooperative Revolving Loan, which, in response to the growing needs of our people, was later reviewed upward to ₩3.450 Billion. Out of this, ₩1.6 Billion Naira has already been released to beneficiaries across the state.

"Through the Cooperative Revolving Disbursement Programme, we have implemented two phases. Ward-Based Cooperatives Initiatives, expanded from 332 to

401 wards, with 389 wards fully benefitting. So far, ₩736,050,000 interest-free loans have been disbursed at the grassroots level, directly impacting over 20,000 households.

"We extended our reach to Osun indigenes outside the state, disbursing \$\frac{1}{2}\$50,000,000 to beneficiaries in Abuja and Northern Nigeria.

"Together, these interventions bring our total Cooperative Revolving Loan Disbursement to ₩1,586,000,000.00.

"In September 2024, we flagged off the New Working Capital of the MSMEDF Programme, laying the foundation for the Ultra-Modern Office Complex of Osun Micro Credit Agency, and disbursed \$\frac{1}{2}\$250 million MSMEDF cheques to prospective loan applicants.

"In May 2025, the Ministry, in collaboration with Fidelity Bank, organized a Food Bank Initiative where over 3,000 residents received free foodstuffs to cushion the hardship of the times.

"We are also upgrading the Sen. Isiaka Adetunji Adeleke College of Cooperative Studies, Ode-Omu, to become a Uniosun campus for cooperative and management studies, starting

academic activities in September 2025 with approved programmes in Taxation, Transport M a n a g e m e n t , Development Studies, and others.

"Our administration has empowered persons living with disabilities, in partnership with Project Enable Africa, while also rehabilitating and upgrading structures at the Cooperative College in Ode-Omu", the Governor added.

Welcoming the governor and the team, the Commissioner for Empowerment and Cooperatives Development, Prince Bayo Ogungbangbe noted that the event is not just a presentation of empowerment

items, but a testimony of this administration's commitment to sustainable development, youth empowerment, women's inclusion, and inclusive economic growth.

He charged beneficiaries to use these opportunities wisely to grow their businesses diligently, and become worthy ambassadors of this noble initiative.

Osun Jumps From 30th To 6th In National Climate Governance Ranking

Osun State has achieved another major milestone in Climate Action drive climbing from the 30th position in 2024 to 6th place in Nigeria's 2025 Subnational Climate Governance Performance Ranking.

Osun State achieved a total score of 265, marking emerging as the second-best performing state in the South-West region after Lagos State.

This is the 2nd Edition of the Sub-national Climate Governance Performance Ranking Report, an initiative of the Federal Government of Nigeria with support from the Society for Planet and Prosperity (SPP).

A statement by Spokesperson to Osun State Governor, Mallam Olawale Rasheed noted that the report provides a comprehensive assessment of how Nigerian states are implementing climate policies, strengthening institutional frameworks, and driving local climate action, serving as a key

tool for accountability, in novation, and collaboration toward achieving a sustainable and resilient future for all Nigerians.

The statement reads in part, "In this 2025 edition, Osun State achieved a total score of 265, marking an exceptional leap from 30th position in 2024 to 6th position / and emerging as the second-best performing state in the South-West region after Lagos State.

"This remarkable improvement underscores the vision and strategic investments of His Excellency, Senator Ademola Jackson Nurudeen Adeleke, Executive Governor of Osun State, whose administration has made climate change, circular economy, renewable energy, and environmental sustainability a core pillar of governance and development.

Osun NULGE berates FG For Releasing LG Funds To "Sacked" APC Chairmen

Members of the Nigeria Union of Local Government Employee, NULGE, Osun State have berated the Federal Government for releasing six months withheld Local Government Council allocation to the "sacked" All Progressives Congress officials.

Council allocation in the state was withheld since February 2025 following imbroglio over control of council secretariats by officials of both the APC and the PDP leading to the closure of secretariats across the state and NULGE withdrawal of services.

Addressing newsmen in Osogbo on Sunday, NULGE President, Dr Nathaniel Ogungbangbe along with other leaders described release of the fund to APC officials as an abuse of power by officials of the Federal Government, including the Minister of Finance, the Attorney-General and Accountant-General of the Federation.

"We have it on good authority that these three Principal Officers of the Federal Government have released the Osun State

Local Government Councils Allocations for the month of March, 2025 to August, 2025 to the illegal Bank Accounts opened by court-sacked APC Chairmen and Councilors.

"We find this development very scary and alarming. Paying Local Government Allocations into privately opened and illegal Bank Accounts of politicians is unbelievable, bizarre and unprecedented in the history of public administration in

"We strongly believe that if these three Principal Officers of the Federal Government and the entire Federal Government which they represent do not have respect for our Constitution, which they have sworn to uphold, they ought to have respect for our Judicial Authorities more particularly the Supreme Court of Nigeria before whom the suit in respect of these funds is currently pending.

"This is supposed to be a democracy and we insist on the RULE OF LAW. We cannot be expected to work with politicians who have been sacked by competent Courts of Law but are being imposed on our state by the Attorney-General", he said.

How Drug Abuse Affects Women In The Society

he perception of drug abuse as a male-dominated issue has changed in recent years, and it is now increasingly viewed as a social disaster that also impacts women.

Reports indicate that more women across Nigeria, are turning to substances such as tramadol, codeine, cannabis, and even hard drugs like cocaine and heroin.

Health professionals and security agencies warn that this practice is not only destroying the lives of the women involved but also leaving deep scars on families and the wider society.

Unlike men, the effects of substance abuse on women are often more catastrophic. As mothers, caregivers, and breadwinners, their addiction extends beyond the individual, disrupting children's lives, destabilizing households, and straining communities.

The growing prevalence of drug abuse among women calls for urgent attention. Experts warn that ignoring the problem could worsen social problems such as broken families, school dropouts, prostitution, and rising crime, with long-term consequences for society at large.

Just like in the case of men, one of the most common reasons women fall into drug abuse is peer pressure. Many young women, particularly students and apprentices seeking a sense of belonging often mix with the wrong crowd, where taking substances is seen as fashionable or even a sign of boldness.

Emotional stress is another major factor that drives drug abuse among women. For years, drugs have been considered a form of escape for people battling depression, anxiety, or trauma.

Women, in particular, are more vulnerable due to hormonal changes that sometimes affect mood and behaviour. Without proper counseling or support systems, substances like codeine syrup or tramadol easily become a way to numb pain or forget life's struggles.

While emotional struggles push some women toward drug abuse, poverty remains another powerful driver. For instance, single mothers facing economic hardship often struggle to provide for themselves and their children. Some, in desperation, turn to selling drugs as a means of survival, only to end up becoming consumers themselves.

The burden of unemployment and low-paying jobs also plays a role. Many women, frustrated by the lack of opportunities, seek temporary relief in substances such as cannabis or tramadol. Unfortunately, the comfort these drugs seem to provide is short-lived, leaving behind even greater damage to health, finances, and overall wellbeing.

Some women suffering from domestic violence and abusive relationships also turn to drug abuse. In many cases, abusive partners deliberately introduce them to substances as a means of control, making the women more dependent and less able to resist the toxic relationship. For such victims, drugs become both a coping mechanism and a trap.

Similarly, a weak family foundation or lack of parental guidance can set the stage for drug abuse. Young women who grow up in unstable homes where parents are absent, negligent, or even addicted themselves often lack the support system to resist negative influences. Without strong family values or supervision, they become more vulnerable to peer pressure, exploitation, and eventual drug use.

Although the reasons behind drug abuse in women vary, the results are frequently the same, lives destroyed. There are a number of consequences that go beyond the individual when casual use turns into reliance. The real effects of drug abuse are most seen in the years that follow, from deteriorating health to strained families and a sense of insecurity in the community.

Studies have shown that women are more sensitive to the consumption and long-term effects of drugs than men. From absorption to metabolic processes, women often struggle more in physically managing the consequences of drug use. Because drugs remain in their systems longer, women face higher risks of organ damage and drug-related diseases.

Medical experts note that while both men and women share some health consequences of drug abuse such as the risk of contracting HIV/AIDS and hepatitis from injection drug use, or memory loss associated with marijuana, women's responses are distinct. They are



more vulnerable to reproductive complications and other health issues linked to gynecology.

For instance, drug abuse has been found to interfere with women's menstrual cycles, causing irregular periods, heavier or lighter flows, and painful cramps. Some women even resort to using illicit substances as self-medication for body aches or menstrual discomfort, unknowingly worsening their health in the process.

Women who use hard substances like heroin or methadone sometimes experience amenorrhea, the complete absence of menstrual periods. This can mislead them into believing they cannot conceive, while also causing them to misinterpret early pregnancy symptoms as withdrawal signs.

Such confusion places both mother and child at risk, as women may continue substance use without realizing they are pregnant. Drug abuse in nursing mothers further endangers infants through contaminated breast milk, compounding the dangers across generations.

Beyond physical health, drug abuse also leaves deep scars on women's mental wellbeing. Substances that are often taken to escape stress or trauma end up worsening psychological conditions.

Depression is one of the most common outcomes. Women who rely on drugs like codeine or cannabis for relief often sink deeper into sadness and hopelessness, especially when the temporary "high" wears off. This cycle fuels dependency and leaves them feeling trapped.

Anxiety and paranoia are also frequent consequences. Continuous drug use alters brain chemistry, making women overly fearful, suspicious, or restless. In extreme cases, this develops into full-blown psychosis, where they lose touch with reality.

Experts also warn of the high risk of suicidal thoughts among women struggling with addiction. The combination of stigma, social isolation, and altered brain function leaves many feeling cornered, with tragic consequences for themselves and their families.

Drug abuse among women does not only affect the individual but also destabilizes families. As mothers and caregivers, addicted women often neglect their responsibilities at home, leaving children vulnerable to hunger, poor schooling, and emotional trauma.

Many marriages and relationships collapse under the weight of drug addiction. Spouses and extended family members frequently complain of mistrust, constant quarrels, and financial strain, which eventually lead to separation or divorce.

Children, in particular, bear the heaviest burden. Growing up in an environment where the mother is dependent on drugs can expose them to neglect, abuse, or early entry into street life. In many cases, such children drop out of school or repeat the same cycle of substance abuse.

Communities are not spared either. As more women fall into addiction, cases of prostitution, theft, and petty crime increase, creating insecurity in neighborhoods. What begins as a personal struggle soon becomes a social problem that affects everyone.

In a world where women are striving to take up more active roles in providing for their families rather than being confined to homemaking, drug dependence undermines their productivity. Women battling addiction often struggle to perform effectively at home and in workplaces, leading to serious financial losses.

This inability to contribute meaningfully to businesses, farms, or offices reduces household income and weakens community development. In some cases, the financial strain caused by addiction pushes women into prostitution or transactional sex. This not only exposes them to sexually transmitted infections but also deepens the cycle of poverty and dependence.

The ripple effects extend to communities. Rising cases of petty crime, theft, and fraud are often linked to women trying to sustain their drug habits. Such activities undermine peace and security, leaving neighborhoods vulnerable.

Public safety becomes an even bigger concern as drug abuse spreads among women. From disorderly conduct to direct involvement in drug peddling, communities are beginning to feel the social tension caused by women struggling with addiction.

However, the government has stepped up campaigns to curb drug abuse, particularly by introducing sensitization programmes in schools and communities. Security agencies also continue to arrest traffickers and users, yet rehabilitation remains a greater challenge.

In addition to government efforts, some nongovernmental organizations (NGOs) are also actively involved in tackling the problem. They organize awareness workshops targeted at women, teaching them the dangers of drug abuse while at the same time offering counseling services for those already affected.

Similarly, religious and community groups have joined the fight by preaching against drug use and setting up support programmes for families in distress. Their influence is significant because it helps to break the silence around the issue, especially in rural communities where stigma is often stronger.

Nevertheless, despite these combined efforts, the fight against drug abuse among women still faces major obstacles. There are very few rehabilitation centres, and those that exist are often underfunded. Moreover, stigma prevents many women from seeking help openly, leaving them trapped in cycles of addiction and silence.

To effectively tackle the problem, experts suggest that stronger laws should be enforced against the sale and distribution of illicit drugs. By disrupting supply chains, fewer women would have easy access to harmful substances.

There is also a pressing need for more rehabilitation centres in the society. Women battling addiction require safe spaces where they can receive medical care, counseling, and long-term reintegration support.

Furthermore, sensitization campaigns should specifically target women in marketplaces, schools, religious gatherings, and women's associations. Through these platforms, women can be educated on the dangers of drug abuse and shown pathways to recovery.

In addition, empowerment programmes can help reduce vulnerability. When women are given access to vocational training, small business grants, or stable employment, they are less likely to turn to drugs as a coping mechanism for poverty and hardship.

Breaking this cycle requires more than arrests and awareness campaigns; it demands compassion, investment, and collective responsibility. When women are protected, empowered, and supported, the entire society benefits but when they are left to battle addiction alone, the cost is paid by everyone.

ell us how the journey began.

My journey began in a very funny way. Actually, my Dad is a painter and while I was still a kid, he saw me climbing a mango tree, he just walked past me, he didn't say anything. So there was a day I came back from school, I climbed the same mango tree and then he was like "Since you like climbing trees maybe you should come and start climbing ladders and that was how my journey began as a painter.

What were the challenges of turning your passion into a business?

I have faced so many challenges, my work personally is something so many people are not into, especially ladies, so I have faced so many challenges from the Engineer, from my clients and so many people but I have been driven by my passion. So I don't see it as a challenge, I face it head-on.

How has being based in Osogbo influenced your style or opportunities?

My journey started when I got married and moved to Osogbo. Being in Osun state, I faced so many challenges, firstly there was no connection, I didn't know anyone here and I just had my family, my husband was there for me when I started, so I was able to scale through. I don't reject job offers, even if it's a shop, I do it. From there, people who would award me a contract, saw me and referrals have been helpful too.

What has been your proudest moment or biggest project so far?

To the glory of God, I have handled so many projects. One of the projects is the Timsed Hotel at Ijebu Ijesa. That was my first biggest project when I graduated from my dad. I didn't even believe I could handle such a big project, I was able to do it with my team and we ordered for paint, everything went smoothly. Anytime I pass that same place again, I'm always proud of myself that this is one of my works.

How do you handle moments of self-doubt?

At times when I meet some clients, when I'm doing my job, some will complain, and they will ridicule me for being a lady painter. I'd even finish the job without any complaints they will owe, some people will owe me for my work. I would deliver their job perfectly, but they will still owe. So I began to doubt myself, that maybe I should venture into something else or I should just give up, you know, but my husband has been there, he's always encouraging me that sooner or later the people that will appreciate my work will appreciate it so that shouldn't be a big deal for me. He has always been there, helpful.

How do you stay updated with global trends in art while still preserving your originality?

My motor is living and learning. I believe so much in that, if you want to upgrade, you have to learn. You have to be openminded, I go to seminars, I search online, one has to be updated in painting. We have so many colours, so many paints and the method of application is different. I go to seminars, anywhere they're taking seminars. I went to a master class in decorative painting recently. I'm a proud decorator too. I can decorate, I can do many colours, most of my work, I produce the paint myself, almost all of my work because I learnt paint production too. I can produce almost every painting.

Do you feel painters in Nigeria get enough recognition compared to musicians or actors?

No, no, we are not being recognised enough and I want a platform whereby painters especially female painters, We are not many, especially here in Osogbo, I've only seen one or two. The government should do better in helping us, by organising platforms for us where we can showcase our talent or teach people how things are done too, so our voice needs to be heard.

Can you share a major setback you faced as a painter and how you overcame it?

One of the major setbacks was when I was pregnant with my child, it was around 2020 during lockdown. I had to work in Abuja then, because my client insisted I must come and do the work, so my dad was there to assist me, my elder brother, because we are just three in the family and we are into painting. My son was two months old then and work was so hectic, but I had to be there, I had to deliver. That was a major setback, breastfeeding and coping with my job. Though I was able to deliver the job.

What's the most unexpected lesson entrepreneurship has taught you?

There are so many lessons and one of them is, using my

money to execute contracts, I will not do that again, I've done that a lot. I've learnt not to use my money to execute any work.

Taking Healthcare Delivery Beyond The Wall Of Freedom

n August 28, 2025, the trajectory of healthcare delivery was reshaped in Osun state. The new reality is that qualitative healthcare services can be accessed beyond the wall of freedom— that is the Correctional Service. What this mean, in essence, is that prisoners will enjoy their rights to qualitative healthcare just like any other person in the society.

Overtime, many are persuaded by prevailing circumstances to assume that, in addition to the restriction of freedom, prisoners are not entitled to having good healthcare services. But that will no longer be the case, at least in Osun state, as the Osun Health Insurance Agency (OSHIA) will be providing a broad healthcare coverage for every inmates in the state.

That was incredible and anyone who has been to Correctional facilities, and experience first-hand, the debilitating state of health of inmates, will have no much trouble in recognising the significance of the intervention by the OSHIA. While it is true that inmates are serving terms for series of offenses, it does not however preclude them from enjoying certain rights, particularly access to qualitative healthcare services.

This understanding, I presume, informed the decision of the Controller of Corrections Service, Osun Command, Mr. Olalekan Rotimi Oluwadele, to impress on the OSHIA management, led by Dr. Rasaq Akindele, for the inclusion of prisoners in the state's healthcare insurance scheme.

Speaking at the flag-off of the enrollment of inmates, Mr. Olalekan noted that "Your Excellency, upon my assumption of duty as the State Controller in September 2024, I visited critical stakeholders in the state including the Executive Secretary, Osun Health Insurance Agency, Dr. Rasaq Akindele and I emphasised majorly on the enrollment of our inmates and he promised to discuss with you sir, as a listening Governor, he conveyed your message back to us that you had expressly and graciously approved the enrollment of 1,200 inmates into OHIS, which we are witnessing today."

Giving the lean resources available to Correctional Service, managing the health of inmates may prove difficult. And the implication of this reality can be telling on the inmates, which could lead to complications in the health or in worse case scenarios, cost some of them their lives. That is the gap that the OHIA will be filling with the enrollment of inmates in Osun state.

The healthcare coverage will provide inmates with a broad access to medical help and ensure that they are not lost to avoidable deaths as was the case before now. To put the intervention in a proper perspective, the healthcare coverage for inmates in Osun state will save life. Before now, inmates go through tough experience to get medical help, and in most cases, too insignificant to resolve their healthcare issues as a result of the lean resources available to Correctional Service.



That experience is what OSHIA will be changing for the better, making sure that not only inmates given access to qualitative healthcare, they will also be able to get drugs at a relatively low price or even free. The healthcare coverage will adequately answer the healthcare needs of inmates and make sure that even though they are receiving punishment for misdeeds, their health does not suffer.

Let us take a moment and be frank with ourselves. Inmates are not aliens but a part of the society that must not be discarded, not minding whatever offences that put them in their current situations. This much was acknowledged by Governor Ademola Adeleke at the flag-off of the enrollment of inmates as he noted that "We (Adeleke government) regard inmates in our correctional facilities as bonafide citizens of the State and of our country. Their healthcare and general wellbeing must remain a matter of priority. As you must all have observed, our administration does not discriminate on any basis; whether political affiliation, tribe, religion or gender, in extending dividends of democracy to all citizens and residents of Osun State."

That was awesome and speak much about the interest that the Adeleke administration has shown in the healthy living of citizens, irrespective of their situations or status. The healthcare coverage for inmates in Osun state highlights the progress that the OSHIA has made under Dr. Rasaq Akindele, expanding healthcare coverage beyond the wall of freedom.

Even more, specialized treatment such as surgery will be covered for inmates, making sure that they can get over whatever health challenges they k encounter.

And mind you, the cost for not just medical bills will be covered by the healthcare coverage but also cost of drugs in certified pharmacies. This is what inmates in Osun state will be enjoying going forward. And you know what; Osun is the first state in the whole of Nigeria to do this—a clear demonstration of Governor Adeleke's commitment to improving the welfare condition of the people of Osun state, which in this instance, are inmates.

Adewale Egbedun, the House drew attention to unlawful financial directives allegedly issued in some Local Governments, including Boluwaduro Local Government, authorising deductions of up to 15 percent of September 2025 allocations in favour of private individuals.

The Speaker described such actions as illegal, unconstitutional, and without any budgetary approval, stressing that Treasurers are not legally recognised signatories to Local Government accounts under extant laws. The House reaffirmed that only the Local Government Chairman and the Director of Administration and General Services, both officers of the Local Government Service Commission, are duly empowered to operate such accounts in line with the Osun State Guidelines on Local Government Administration and the Public Financial Management Law, 2020.

Citing its Resolution of 29th September, 2025, the Assembly reiterated that no withdrawals or deductions may be made from Local Government accounts without strict compliance with the Constitution, internal regulations, and approved budgets. It further warned that any financial institution processing unauthorised instructions would be deemed complicit in financial misconduct, in violation of multiple national anti-corruption laws, including the Money Laundering (Prevention and Prohibition) Act, 2022, and would face the full weight of the law.

The Speaker cautioned that erring banks risk severe consequences, including summons before the House, arrest warrants, blacklisting, and referrals to anti-corruption agencies for investigation and prosecution.

Now having hitting the brickwall on the LG matter, where will APC turn for victory? They will go to the same Osun people that have endured live without enjoying legitimate support of funds due to their LGAs in the last 8 months? History, the best judge won't forget roles played by individuals in this debacle.

With Adeleke's appointment with fate adorning more glorious outlook, tell whoever cares to listen that I predict the winner of the August 8, 2026 poll and it is going to be the man Osun people trusted in 2022.

In his remarks, the Vice-Chancellor described Bridget's achievement as a


r e fl e c t i o n o f UNIOSUN's vision of producing well-rounded graduates who excel beyond the classroom.

he Osun Health Insurance Scheme (O'HIS) has announced an increase review of its capitation payment to N700 per enrollee, with assurance of further increment soon.

The announcement was made during the Fourth Quarter Service Providers Forum Meeting held on Wednesday at Staff Development Centre, Abeere in Osogbo. capital.

The meeting brought together medical directors. desk officers, and health insurance stakeholders from accross the state.

Speaking with newsmen during the meeting, the Executive Secretary of Ohis, Dr Rasaq Akindele, said the agency has recorded significant improvements in service delivery since the last providers forum.

"After the last providers forum meeting, there has been improvement in the care of enrollees. We have fewer complaints now, and many people are expressing gratitude and appreciation. There has been significant improvement from the last time till today," he stated.

Akindele added that the agency decided to increase the capitation rate in response to the current economic realities.

"We know there's a need for us to increase what we pay as capitation, considering the present economic situation. We have increased it to N700 per enrollee for now, and we plan to raise it further in the shortest possible time," he assured.

He, however advised that healthcare providers should reciprocate the gesture by showing more commitment and diligence in delivering quality care to enrollees.

Also speaking, Dr Akinpelu Ayodeji Desk Officer for the Basic Health Care Provision Fund commended the Ohis coverage and the scope of services offered to beneficiaries.

"From the presentation today, it's clear that both primary and secondary services are well captured. Primary services such as malaria, typhoid, urinary tract infections, and other basic health issues are all covered. We expect all service providers to deliver these services to enrollees," he said.

In her words, Dr Dare Folasade, a Consultant Psychiatrist at the State Specialist Hospital, Asubiaro, Osogbo, described the forum as an avenue for knowledge sharing and service improvement.

"This meeting helps us stay updated on new developments within OHIS. We've learned that some packages we thought were not part of the scheme are actually available. This will improve service delivery in our hospital, and we appreciate OHIS and the state government for their continuous efforts," she said.

Another provider, Dr

Olatunji Odebunmi appealed to the government to review the capitation further, noting that rising drug prices have affected healthcare operations.

"As providers, we are running at a loss because drug prices have skyrocketed. We urge the government to further review the capitation upward," Odebunmi pleaded.

Omisore, who represented Osun east from 2003 to 2011 in the senate, said the ambition is about restoring hope and strengthening governance in the state.

"This is not just my mission, it is a collective one. I believe strongly that together, we can restore hope, strengthen governance, and deliver a brighter future for every son and daughter of Osun," he wrote.

Prior to the entry of Omisore into the race, MD CEO of National Inland Waterways, Bola Oyebamiji is reportedly the favourite of both leaders and members of the party.

Recall that Osun Spring had earlier reported that Otunba Iyiola Omisore has named all APC Chairmen in the state as his campaign coordinator across the

Omisore made this known in a now viral video obtained by Osun Spring in a meeting he held with all Ward Chairmen of APC in Osun state.

Osun Spring reports that there are now 9 aspirants in Osun APC hustling to become the party's flagbearer.

Meanwhile, the All Progressives Congress (APC) has officially slated its governorship primary election in Osun State for December 13, 2025, ahead of the August 8, 2026 governorship poll.

According to a timetable released by the party's National Organising Secretary, Sulaiman Argungu, and made available at the party's national secretariat in Abuja on Tuesday, the nomination and expression of interest forms will cost ₩50 million.

The election process is set to kick off with a formal notice to the Osun State chapter on October 3, 2025, while an update of the party's membership register will run from October 20 to 31, 2025. Only members who are financially up to date-having paid their dues up to February 2025-and appear in the updated register will be eligible to participate as voters or aspirants.

Key dates on the party's election timetable include:

Sale of forms begins: November 12, 2025

Deadline for submission of completed forms and delegate list: December 1,2025

The APC has waived the cost of the nomination form for women and persons with disabilities, requiring them to only pay for the expression of interest form, as part of its inclusion policy.

Youth aspirants between ages 25 and 40 will also enjoy a 50% discount on the nomination form, while paying the full fee for the expression of interest.

As of the time of filing this report, no fewer than a dozen party chieftains have shown interest in clinching the party's ticket.

Among the frontrunners are Senator Ajibola Basiru, National Secretary of the APC; Bola Oyebamiji, Managing Director of the National Inland Waterways Authority (NIWA); Otunba lyiola Omisore, Former Deputy Governor of Osun State; Dr. Akin Ogunbiyi, businessman/insurance expert; Dotun Babayemi; Senator Babajide Omoworare; Senator Mudashiru Hussain; Benedict Alabi, Former Deputy Governor; Kunle Adegoke (SAN), Legal luminary, among others.

Mainstream Schools Can Be Made Inclusive, Not Segregated — Ayeni

A non-profit organization, Community Advancement Initiative For Self-Reliance, CAI4SR has disclosed that creating schools for people with disabilities encourages segregation and undermines their sense of belonging.

Speaking with newsmen after a training session in Osogbo recently, CAI4SR's Executive Director, Eni Aveni counselled the government to allow inclusive education by adapting mainstream schools with children with disabilities.

According to her, global advocacy for disability rights is anchored on inclusion, stressing that persons with disabilities thrive better in societies where barriers are removed rather than in environments where they are secluded.

Recalling a project undertaken by CAI4SR to promote inclusion for children with disabilities, Ayeni noted that the existing schools can be adjusted to accommodate them through what she described

as "reasonable adjustments," such as ramps, and accessible toilets.

"We already have schools on the ground, let's make what we call reasonable adjustments so that children with disabilities can equally learn with children without disabilities. By doing that, you are giving them a sense of belonging", she said.

She added that establishing special schools for children with disabilities will only reinforce stereotypes and deepen segregation.

In the same vein, she lauded the domestication of the Osun State Persons With Disability Law but urged for its implementation. stressing that without practical enforcement, the law would remain "only on paper"

Also speaking, a lawyer with the Justice Development and Peacemaker Center,

Veronica Onoja, emphasized that the government has a critical role to play in ensuring the implementation of the policy.

Onoia identified lack of awareness and poor funding as major obstacles to the enforcement of the Osun State Disability Law, noting that many citizens were unaware of its existence and therefore unable to demand its implementation.

"If people do not know there is a law protecting persons with disabilities, they cannot push for its implementation", Onoja said.

The Command while appreciating the Federal Government for several reform in the NCoS noted that President Bola Tinubu through Minister of Interior, Hon Bunmi Tunji-Ojo has approving increment in feeding

allowance of inmates to 1.125.

The Controller of Corrections, Osun Command, Olalekan Rotimi Oluwadele who made this known at the flag off of enrollment of Inmates in Osun into the State Insurance Scheme by Governor Ademola Adeleke tied the amount spent on feeding to the current number of inmates in Osun state which stand at 1,100.

"The Federal government has done a lot

of reforms in the Nigerian Correctional Service since the inception of the present administration led by President Bola Ahmed Tinubu, GCFR through the Honourable Minister of Interior, Hon. Dr. Olubunmi Tunji-Ojo. The daily feeding allowance for inmates has been increased to N1,125", he said.

Osun Spring reports by going by the amount per individual, Nigeria Correctional Services in Osun spends over 1.2million to feed inmates daily.

He noted further that Correctional Services has also transitioned from being in the exclusive list to the concurrent list, which implies that both the Federal and State Government is responsible for its operations and running.

State Government now bears responsibility for its operations which are: Custodial service and Non-Custodial service", he added.

"The Osun Osogbo shrine is another UNESCO site that is a continuous state focussed intervention area. The state governor has marked the Osun Osogbo as a global event of statutory state support.

"Governor Adeleke is however enforcing observance of the budgetary and procurement process to ensure that the various upgrade and expansion projects are captured within the budget, processed through the procurement process and posted on the procurement website.

Societal Expectations: An Unnecessary Pressure On Youths

o c i e t a l expectations are the invincible script we're all handed from a young age: get good grades, be social, have a vibrant social life, be the perfect friend and family member, all while maintaining flawless mental and physical health.

It is a checklist the "ideal" youth, technically achievable but often at a devastating cost. I've watched peers come close to this ideal, but they always sacrifice something, most often their mental well-being.

This immense pressure isn't just exhausting, it's a source of profound pain, leading many down a path of anxiety and depression and in most tragic cases suicide.

This pressure originates from several key sources, each adding another weight to the burden young people carry.

Firstly, parental pressure is a significant contributor. Almost all parents in the world want the best for their children. Nowadays, many parents push their children to attend extra classes and pursue courses the parents choose for them. When youths are burdened with these high expectations, they experience intense stress and exhaustion because they cannot bear to disappoint their parents.

While parents have good intentions, they often fails to understand the emotional effects on their children. It is healthy to want to bring out the best in your child, but sometimes the pressure to perform can have serious consequences.

Many popular celebrities in Nigeria, studied Law, medicine among other professional courses in different Universities but ended up being musicians, actors or social media influencers against the desires of their parents. Some who could not dare their parents still live under their influence or protection.

Compounding this pressure is the modern phenomenon of social media. In this digital era, social media is almost inescapable. Platforms like Facebook, instagram and tiktok have a powerful influence, exerting a new form of social pressure.

For many youths, these platforms create intense



pressure to maintain impressive "cool" profiles where popularity is quantified by likes, shares and comments.

This environment fosters cyberbullying, which can leave victim anxious, depressed and constantly stressed. The mindset of young adult is easily affected by these negative issues, making the Misuse of Social Media a major factor in societal pressure.

For example, many tiktokers experience significant emotional distress when their accounts are banned, a reaction that underscores the deep connection they have to their digital community. This often also often escalate into their personal lives, attracting negative attention and comments from the public.

Furthermore, youths face intense internal and psychological pressures.

This is often driven by a deep-seated desire to fit In and the overwhelming fear of an unknown future. A youth who feels, lost without guide, and terrified of the future is under huge pressure to have everything figured out. This internal struggle, combined with external voices, can lead to devastating outcome.

Also, most influencers promotes fake lifestyles, for young audiences the compulsion to imitate these impossible high standards can have serious consequences. Including debt from high spending, over identify with a life that isn't real

The syndrome of youth anxiety is borne out of despair and disappointment. It manifest in social vices such as

sexual promiscuity a problem prevalent in institutions due to the pressure that "everybody is doing it" and cultism, often fueled by factors like unstable home, life and poverty.

The consequences of this multifaceted pressure are severe and widespread. Research confirms that adolescence and emerging adulthood are crucial periods for wellbeing and mental health, as this stage involves many changes in relationships, social role, and the adoption of responsibilities.

Yet, we must ask: who is "society"? The uncomfortable answer is that we are. We are the ones prolonging these pressures through thoughtless comments, extreme bullying and the expectations we inherit from previous generations and pass on. It is a cycle, and we need to be the ones to break it.

The good news is that we have the power to do so. Managing this stress starts with practical, intentional strategies aimed at reclaiming your autonomy.

The first step is building self-awareness, the foundation for managing stress from societal expectations. By understanding your value and authentic self, you can differentiate between expectations that align with your goals and those imposed externally.

Practicing mindfulness, such as daily self-reflection or journaling, helps identify when your actions are influenced by external pressures.

Recognizing personal

triggers such as family gatherings, performance reviews or social media comparisons, allows you to respond with intentions rather than react out of insecurity.

Self compassion is another critical tool. It counteracts the self criticism that often accompanies unmet expectations. When feeling stressed about not meeting an expectation, ask yourself, "how would I support a friend in this situation?". This shift in perspective foster self acceptance and reduces harsh self judgement, accepting the common humanity of struggle.

Setting healthy boundaries safeguards metal well being by defining what you will and won't accept from others. Personal boundaries help limit the time and energy spent meeting external expectations, while emotional boundaries prevent taking responsibility for others reactions to your choices.

Physical boundaries ensure space for self care, and digital boundaries help mange social media consumption to to reduce unhealthy comparison. Clear communication is key, statement like, "I appreciate your advice, but I need to make this decision for myself", reinforce your autonomy while maintaining respect in relationships.

The journey to break free from these expectations is not about rebellion for its own sake, but about curating a life that is authentically yours. It involves examining each expectation, whether it

comes from parents, peers, or platforms and asking "does this align with who I am and who I want to become?".

The curation process requires redefining success on your own terms. Success does not have to be a linear path with predetermined milestones at specific ages. It can be a mixture of experiences, learnings, failures, and personal triumphs that may not look impressive in social media feed but bring genuine contentment and growth.

The role of parents and mentors must evolve from directors to supporters. Instead of mapping a life paths for young adults, the goal should be to equip them with emotional tool to navigate their own journey. This includes fostering resilience, critical thinking, and self compassion needed to with stand societal pressures.

Furthermore, the role of religious institutions must extend beyond the pulpit. In an era of intense social pressure they have a critical mandate to actively guide and educate young people, building a foundation of self worth that protects them. This means creating youth programs that directly address digital wellness, using faith as a framework for resilience rather than a retreat from the modern world.

Educational institutions also bear a responsibility. Beyond academic excellence, curricula should integrate life skills such as digital literacy, emotional intelligence,

and mindfulness practices. Preparing students for the real world means preparing them for psychological challenges they will inevitably face, not just the intellectual ones.

The economic structures that intensify this pressure cannot be ignored. The instability of jobs, the soaring cost of living and competitive nature of the economy create a tangible foundation for anxiety.

Addressing societal pressure is not just about changing mindset, it also requires advocating for economic policies that provide youths with a more stable and equitable foundation to build their lives upon.

Surrounding yourself with people who celebrate you, not a perfect image, creates a buffer against societal pressure. These relationships provides a safe space to be vulnerable, to share struggles without judgement, and to receive validation that you are enough, exactly as you are.

Identity exploration is not a sign of being lost, it is a necessary and healthy process of finding one's self

However, in cultures that demandearly specialization and rapid success, this exploratory period is often seen as a luxury or a failure, rather than a crucial development stage.

It is helpful to remember that most people are too preoccupied with their own lives to scrutinize yours as closely as you might fear. This realization can be freeing, allowing you to make choices based on your desires rather than in perceived judgement.

Also, the future of work is also changing rapidly. Careers that exist today, may not tomorrow, and new ones are constantly emerging. This fluidity means that adaptability, creativity and continuous learning are not valuable assets than rigidly following a predetermined, "safe" path that may not be safe in a long run.

Navigating societal expectations is a universal challenge, but with a wareness, self compassion and intentional choices, you can reduce the stress they may cause.

By understanding which expectation truly matter to you and developing the courage to release those that don't, you create space for a more authentic and fulfilling life.

The popular novelist, Professor Chinua Achebe of blessed memory wrote his book, Things Fall Apart, in the year 1958. During the time, the late professor pictured many things that were pervasive in the country. I was not a witness, but I could perceive the zephyr and the debris of Nigeria's landscape. During the era, the problem was not insecurity; people slept with their two eyes closed, and travelers embarked on long journeys without phobia. The only thing that fell apart was the laudable voice of colonialists and secessionists fanning embers of discord. To date, the popular novel is still a point of reference. Achebe never made a mistake with his book, though the title is more relevant. Things have fallen into pieces.

Definitely, the country seems to be in pieces, not in peace. If there is peace, there will be no need for a peace talk. Now, it seems the center cannot hold; the falcons cannot hear the falconers. We are in the era of bandits; they kill, maim, and blatantly robe in sophisticated ammunition to attend peace meetings.

Recently, the communities in Faskari Local Government Area, one of the most attacked councils in Katsina State, opened a peace talk with the bandits. At short intervals, the government officials and traditional leaders in the same Katsina State held another round of peace talks with bandits in the Matazu Local Government area of the state.

Also in Zamfara State, the notorious bandit, Bello Turji confirmed that negotiations are underway to end violence and insecurity across Zamfara and other parts of the Northwest region. It is good news, but it is coming from the bandit leader, who can renege on his decision. Instead of the government, bandits assure citizens of safety.

Sadly, the so-called peace talk held in Katsina was

graced by bloodthirsty bandit leaders who have been on the wanted list. The A-list bandit kingpins at the peace meeting included Hassan Dan Tawawe, Ado Alero, Isiya Kwashe Garwa, and Babaro who was accused of killing 32 worshipers in a mosque attack in Katsina.

The message in the whole peace talk was obvious: the bandits neither wanted peace nor interested in surrendering. They only came for a showoff to display their sophisticated weapons before the camera. The opulent display of firearms before the public in military camo is a direct message staring at us. The bandits on the wanted list have turned into celebrities, granting interviews and issuing warnings to the government. Simply put, the meeting was a show of force, not for peace.

If the league of bandits terrorizing the country are now walking freely with their weapons, who will stop the next bandits among the younger generation who witnessed the shameless peace talk when the supposed scapegoats have turned into accidental celebrities? Definitely, the younger ones at the peace meeting will see the killers as mentors and role models, having it in mind that no punishment or penance will come forth for the series of attacks, incendiary acts, and carnage launched by the senior bandits; instead, they are being rehabilitated as repentant killers. Sad!

As published in Sahara Reporters, the Katsina State Government confirmed that bandits have demanded the construction of schools, hospitals, and grazing reserves as part of the ongoing peace efforts in the state. Of course, all citizens deserve a dividend of democracy. Next, the bandits will demand a zoning governorship ticket to their territory as a condition for peace. Where is the way out?

Somberly, the International Organization for Migration estimates that more than 1.3 million people have been



uprooted across the Northwest since February 2025. We are in September, and the death toll counts in millions. What would be the figure by December? Only God knows!

On different occasions, analysts have cautioned that similar peace efforts in Katsina and Zamfara between 2019 and 2021 collapsed after armed groups regrouped and expanded their reach. Many residents, according to reports, said they continue to pay taxes and levies to bandits despite the claims of peace. Then I ask, what have we achieved with the peace talk? If none except the short hiatus, then it is not the solution.

The onus still lies on the government to deploy a new strategy. The insecurity is already spreading faster than expected. Kwara State, the state of harmony, is currently bleeding. It is time to act fast, act differently, and act together before the next generation of bandits surfaces because they have watched their mentors being romanced for peace talks.

Council of State Approves Tinubu's Nominee As New INEC Chairman Group Asks Senate to Reject Nominee

The National Council of State on Thursday gave its unanimous approval to the appointment of Professor Joash Ojo Amupitan (SAN) as the new Chairman of the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC).

President Bola Ahmed Tinubu presented the nomination of Amupitan, a Professor of Law from the University of Jos, to the council during its meeting in Abuja, following the completion of Professor Mahmood Yakubu's tenure, which began in 2015 and ended in October 2025.

President Tinubu told the council that Amupitan, who hails from Ayetoro Gbede in Ijumu Local Government Area of Kogi State, is the first person from the North-Central state to be nominated for the nation's top electoral position.

He described the nominee as "a thoroughbred scholar and an apolitical individual with an unblemished record of service."

According to the President, the nomination aligns with his administration's commitment to strengthening democratic institutions and ensuring credible elections.

Governor Ahmed Usman Ododo of Kogi State, who spoke during the session, praised the President's choice, describing Professor Amupitan as "a man of integrity whose scholarship and leadership in academia stand out."

Following the unanimous endorsement by members of the council—which includes former presidents, governors, and key governors, and key governors.

Amupitan, 58, is currently the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration) at the University of Jos, and also serves as the Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of the Governing Council of Joseph Ayo Babalola University, Osun State

A distinguished academic and Senior Advocate of Nigeria since 2014, he specializes in Company Law, Law of Evidence, Corporate Governance, and Privatisation Law.

Meanwhile, the Association of Legislative Drafting and Advocacy Practitioners (ALDRAP), a professional body of lawyers working within and outside the National Assembly, has petitioned the Senate, urging it to reject the nomination of Professor Joash

Amupitan as Chairman of the Independent National Electoral Commission

In a letter dated October 10, 2025, and addressed to the President of the Senate through the Senate Committee on Electoral Matters, the association warned that Amupitan's appointment would breach constitutional provisions and ethics of public service, citing "likelihood of bias, conflict of interest, and violation of statutory conduct rules."

The petition, signed by ALDRAP's Administrative Secretary, Mr. Jesse Williams Amuga, was specifically directed to the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Electoral Matters, Senator Simon Lalong.

The petition was copied to

several key officials and diplomatic missions, including the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, the Secretary to the Government of the Federation, the Director-General of the Department of State Services (DSS), the Inspector-General of Police, and the Ambassadors of the United States, the European Union, and the United Kingdom.

According to the association, Professor Amupitan's prior engagement as lead counsel to the All Progressives Congress (APC) during the 2023 presidential election petition at the Supreme Court disqualifies him from occupying the sensitive position of INEC Chairman, which demands strict neutrality.

"Professor Joash Amupitan, having served as lead counsel to the APC, cannot perform the duties of INEC Chairman with the required impartiality. His confirmation would violate Section 5 of the Code of Conduct Bureau and Tribunal Act, 1991, which prohibits public officers from placing themselves in situations of conflict between personal interest and official responsibility," the statement read.

The group further referenced Section 19 of the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Act (2003), which criminalizes the use of a former public or private position to gain undue advantage.

It also reminded the Senate of its 2021 precedent in rejecting Lauretta Onochie's nomination as INEC National Commissioner over her partisan affiliation with the ruling party.

Despite the victory, Nigeria's qualification fate remains out of their hands. Benin sit top of the group with 17 points, followed closely by South Africa on 15, meaning the Super Eagles will need to win their last match and hope results elsewhere go their way.

Rwanda, Lesotho, and Zimbabwe complete the standings, with each team now mathematically out of contention.



2026 WAFCON: CAF Expands to 16 Teams

The Confederation of African Football has confirmed that the Women's Africa Cup of Nations finals will expand from 12 to 16 teams beginning with the 2026 edition.

According to the Punch, next year's tournament in Morocco was initially planned to feature 12 nations, with qualifying already at its second and final round.

However, the expansion

means an additional round of qualifying may be introduced, with 11 remaining teams expected to compete for four available slots.

Further details are expected after CAF's executive committee meeting, currently taking place in Kinshasa.

WAFCON began as an eight-team tournament in 1998 and maintained that format until the 2018 edition in Ghana.

The 2020 tournament was

cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic before the competition returned with 12 teams in 2022.

CAF has increased investment in women's football across the continent, with the prize fund for the most recent edition in Morocco rising by 45 per cent to \$3.45m.

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What To Know About Amotekun, Akinlalu And Osun Security Updates -Olawale Rasheed

In this Interview, Mallam Olawale Rasheed, Spokesperson /Special Adviser to Governor Ademola Adeleke spoke extensively on the Amotekun Service and general security situation in Osun State on Rave FM Frank Talk.

ow does the state government react to the tragedy incident in Akinlalu? What immediate action has the Governor taken to restore peace in the affected community beyond visiting the town?

Thank you very much. Let me first put some background. By the time the unfortunate incident happened, the Governor was out of the country. He went out for a brief medical check-up, so he was not in the country when it happened. But from his base in the US, he was giving directives to the Deputy Governor, to the Secretary to the State Government, to the Chief of Staff, to the relevant cabinet members, to security agencies. The next thing that was done was to ensure that a very high-power government team visited Akinlalu for an on-the-spot assessment. On that team were all the security service chiefs from the Police to the DSS and others, including the Special Adviser on Security Matters to the Governor. They went there to do an on-the-spot assessment and to meet the Kabiyesi and others. On their return, the deputy speaker, who is actually from the area representing the people, led another delegation on the directive of the governor, to go and meet and see what can be done immediately to cushion the consequences on the victims. Apart from that, the Governor did something immediately, he publicly condemned the killings and vowed that justice would be done, and all the culprits and the suspects would be made to face the law, In fact, we issued a statement, and a State Security Council meeting was convened where all these issues, the Akinlalu, the banditry issue from Kwara and others were discussed. So, he took immediate steps even when he was not in the country.

Then, the second step the Governor took was that he cut short his medical vacation to say, "let me abandon this check-up, let me quickly go home and sort out this matter." He arrived in the country the day before yesterday, and very early in the morning yesterday, he took off from Lagos and faced Akinlalu in the company of top government and security officials. At Akinlalu, the people understood the scenario and refused the politicisation of the unfortunate incident. The Akinlalu people rejected the politicisation of the incident by the opposition. The Governor has done what he should do as Chief Security Officer of the state namely condemning the killing, commencing reform of Amotekun, announcing that he will never interfere in the police investigation, announcing that whoever is involved in the unfortunate incident should face the wrath of the law, commiserating with the victims, promising compensation and by ensuring that police have freeway to do their job.

Let me ask you what exactly transpired, and I asked because there are some conflicting reports, and some are linking the killings to security lapses. Some say that the report that Amotekun responded to a call was not true, that it was a vengeance attack by the Amotekun. You must have had some preliminary reports on this. What happened?

When you are having an active investigation, it is unprofessional to speak about it. The commissioner of police, through the Deputy Commissioner of Police, Operations, actually gave an update yesterday at Akinlalu. He said they've arrested some Amotekun suspects. He said 20 were arrested already, and he said they are still trying to arrest some who are still at large. Now, as to what actually transpired, you know, normally that is the realm of the Police; they are the ones conducting the investigation. All the hearsay, rumour and facts or falsehoods that may have gotten to the public space may not be actually reliable until the police conclude their investigation and say this is what actually happened at Akinlalu. These are the suspects, and we are arraigning the suspects before the court of law. So it will be out of place for me to actually talk about it because whatever I say now, people can hold it against the government. We want the police to do their job, and the Governor has ordered that he will not interfere or intervene in the police investigation. And as a loyal servant of Mr Governor, I won't want to talk about those details. Let the police do their job, and let the police then address the public as to what actually happened.

I totally understand that, Mallam. Then some say that this incident occurred because of Security lapses since Security meetings do not hold periodically. That the Security Council meeting holds at the instance of the Governor, no plan to even say when the next security council meeting will happen.

That is not true. The State Security Council Meeting holds every month. And let me tell you something. When the Governor

is not around, the Deputy Governor is always around, and if he is not around, there is a hierarchy and a system. So, the system runs on its own; all that needs to be done is to activate the regular running of the system. Okay, let me give you an instance. The Security Council Meeting was held on Monday. The Governor was not there; he was in the US. What is the State Security Council Meeting? We have the assemblage of all security chiefs, Police, Customs, Army, Paramilitary services, including Amotekun. It is always a confidential security meeting deliberating on security reports from across the state. The council checks out security threats, ensures solutions are put in place. For example, the last security meeting dealt with the Akinlalu matter, the issue of how to stop the infiltration of bandits from Kwara, Ekiti states and other sundry issues. So it is not true that the Security Council meeting has not been holding. It has been holding, and it is monthly. And again, there are many security meetings that are not for public consumption. I can tell you that between Monday, when the State Security Council meeting was held, there was another council meeting yesterday. In yesterday's meeting, a full review was also done as to the state of security in Osun and how far the implementation of the resolution of the Monday meeting has gone.

So, if the Governor is not there, we have the Deputy Governor, and if he is also not there, you have top-ranking leaders down the line who normally ensure that things are running. The allegation of security lapses is fake news from the opposition. You know the opposition because the election is close by, has been latching on to everything they can get, and fake news has become a tool of their propaganda. But the Governor has a job to do, and the job to do is to deliver on good governance, democratic dividends to the people of Osun State who elected him and are going to re-elect him by God's grace next year.

Alright, thank you, Mallam. I do acknowledge that there has been relative peace in Osun State for a long while, and the Nigerian Police Force has been doing a beautiful job, but then don't you think this incident is a stain on the border security strategy of the Adeleke administration? Say, especially rural policing.

Thank you very much. Now, let me dwell on the issue of interagency partnership and synergy that you refer to. We have Amotekun across the Southwest because there was a gap in grassroots policing, and all along, the Amotekun and the Police and the DSS have been working cooperatively. There have been largely no issues. In fact, since Governor Adeleke took over, interagency harmony and synergy have become top-notch. There has not been a physical confrontation between the two services; there have been partnerships between Amotekun and other services. Amotekun is down there in the grassroots, feeding the police and the DSS. The partnership is there. Let us attempt this scenario. If you have an infraction at one police post, maybe in Ayedire, is that a license to now profile and condemn the whole Police Service? And again, when a Police man commits an infraction, you won't go around to arrest the commissioner for police. Let's say a policeman shoots somebody at Ikire, and what you are doing is that you want the commissioner of police arrested, that is an abnormality. What is done is that, if there is an operative who committed an infraction, you check which town, who is on ground, who fired the shot, then you pick them, you apply the rule, the law, and charge them to

Mallam, maybe this is a peculiar case. There has been reports earlier of high-handedness of Amotekun operatives, that his men have been like that, maybe not all of them. There have been reports earlier that he didn't bring them over.

If there are reports that the Amotekun has not been working in a certain way or there are errors, the question is, what is the procedure for correction? Amotekun is set up by state law, and the oversight function and provision are there. What is the oversight function? If we discover that the Police or DSS, or any other service, have committed an infraction, the law provides for oversight. Who do we complain to? Is it from the oversight in the House of Assembly, or through the Executive arm, or the office of Special Advisers on security matters? If all these oversight structures fail to take it up. Then you also have another line, a line of applying to the court for the infringement of fundamental rights, just like we have been doing to the police, DSS. Now, you go to court when the oversight function failed to curb the excesses that

you refer to, then you apply to the court for action, to claim damages. These are structures in place to be accessed by all residents if Amotekun commits any infraction. You cannot because of an infraction from one area or another, decapitate the agency. If we have been doing that, we won't have police, we won't want DSS, we won't have the army. Security agencies are subject to oversight and judicial regulations when they err. That is to show you that the system works if we allow it to, if people don't politicise it. So in the case of Amotekun, if there are problems in its operation, then we apply the oversight infrastructure. We have the State Assembly, and we can raise a petition. Or we go to the Governor, or we call the SA security, who has been in the security sector for more than three or four decades, to say we have a petition.

Let me tell you, the Chairman of Amotekun is a retired AIG, topnotch retired AIG Wale Abass, former Commissioner of Police in several states. What I want to say is that there is a board of Amotekun that actually monitors the oversight activities of the commanding cadre. Our people need to understand that we need Amotekun, we need police, we need the Army and all of them. If there are issues with their operational code, we don't have to throw away the baby with the bathwater. We should just allow the system to work. We should not say that because there is an infraction, we should now bring down the whole house.

I was going to raise that later, but since you are there, let's just talk about it a little bit more. We are having this debate that Amotekun should be done away with. And I read the Deputy Speaker of the House of Assembly in Osun calling for calm, saying we should not throw away the baby with the bathwater. But for those who say there are too many infractions, we should do away with Amotekun. What will the state government do, considering the fact that you have an architecture ready and a protocol of what should be done?

I'm happy this debate is coming up, and I want to say something about it. We all know where we are coming from, because actually, when you know where you are coming from, the decision about today is always easy to make. We all know why Amotekun came on board; we all know that the threat is even more active than before. Amotekun did not start only in Osun State; it was a regional initiative. And we all know why it came up, we all know South West was under siege when Amotekun was put in place, and their main job is to ensure that they go to the grassroots, forests, to our rural areas where police and other security agencies might not be able to touch. We will admit that in the course of their duties across the southwest, Amotekun has actually performed creditably well. There is no agency without negatives or shortcomings. What leaders normally do is to correct those errors and ensure that the system now runs in line with the dictates of the law and the protections of the fundamental human rights of the citizens. Those calling to do away with Amotekun, I guess some of them are being political. Some people thought that since it is the PDP that is controlling Osun, the state should be destabilised. The opposition's goal is to run the state into chaos and then get the president to destabilised. state of emergency. You know some people have an evil agenda, but in our own case, if we want to address the issue, what can we do to Amotekun or all the agencies that are having operational questions? What has been done by the police based on the infraction here and there? What the IG normally does is that when you have infractions in some areas, he sets up a small team to review the operational code and fish out where the errors are. Now, in the case of Amotekun, the same system is what the governor is doing. He is putting everything in place to correct every anomaly. The Chairman of the Amotekun board is working on a system review, operational review, then compliance mode to say okay if we have operational guidelines, why are people breaching them if there is any. Now, how do we ensure that nobody breaches the operational code of Amotekun? The board of Amotekun is already working on it, and it will provide operational review and protocol review to Mr Governor, the State Executive Council, and the House of Assembly for review. The issue of disbanding Amotekun is like forgetting where you are coming from. We need the Amotekun in our rural areas to complement the good job of the DSS, the Police, the Army and other security services. That's why Governor Adeleke is saying, "No, I notice this error, the police should dig into it, give us a report of what happened, allow the suspect to face the law". To say we should do away with Amotekun is from an opposition angle, and that is because they want us in chaos; they are not happy with the rapid development happening in the state.

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
